



Supplementary Features

Adds color to the basic narrative. Each feature ends with questions that promote critical thinking.

- Americana. This feature in the OpenStax text explores the significance of artifacts from American pop culture and considers what values, views, and philosophies are reflected in these objects.
- Defining "American." This feature analyzes primary sources, including documents, speeches, and other writings, to consider important issues of the day while keeping a focus on the theme of what it means to be American.
- My Story. This feature presents firstperson accounts (diaries, interviews, letters) of significant or exceptional events from the American experience.
